PHASE II

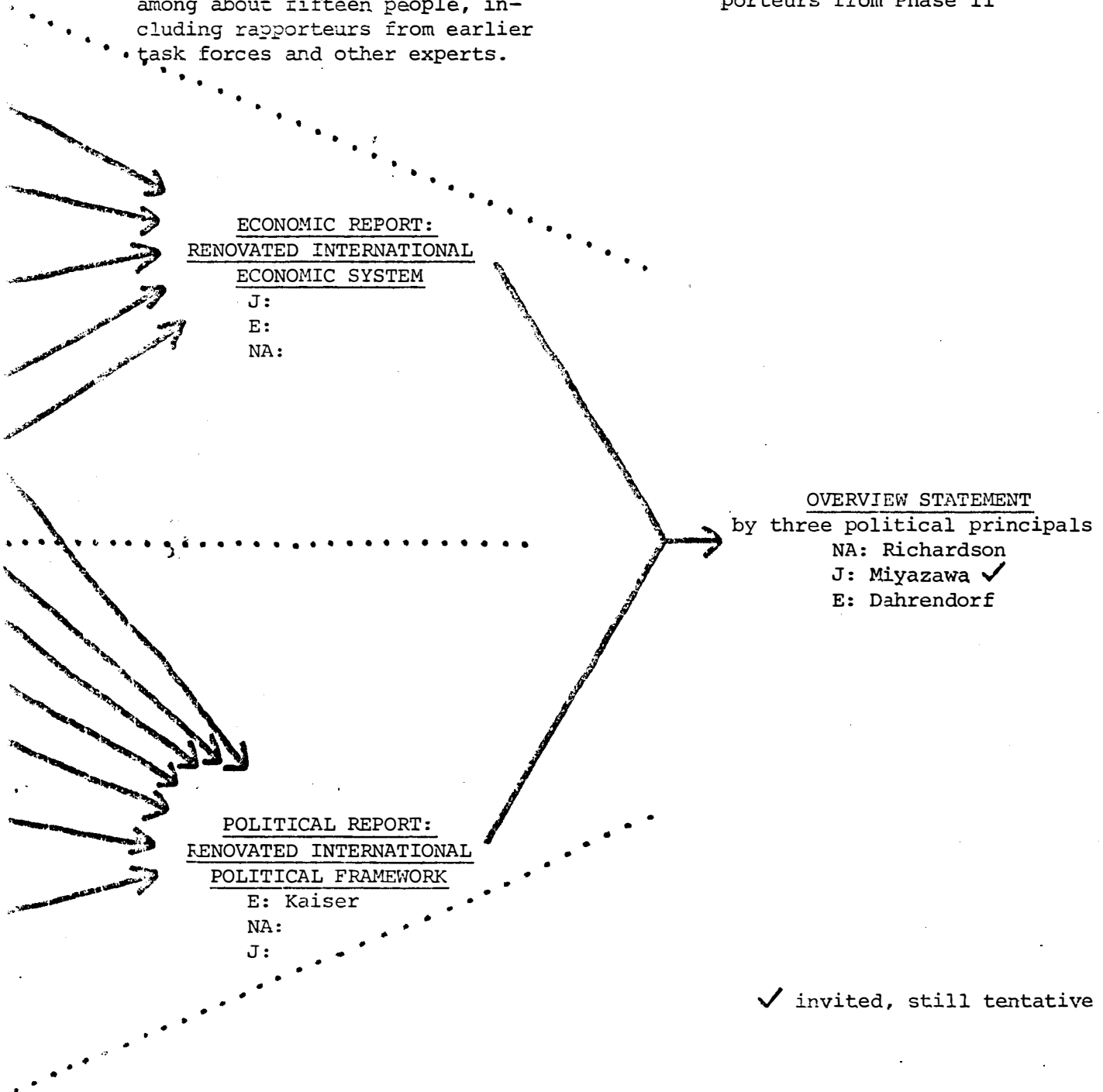
Fall 1975 - Spring 1976

(almost concurrent with Phase II) a brief statement (10 pages) by three major political figures, outlining the Renovated International System. This would be coordinated by the Commission Director, and assisted by the two principal rapporteurs from Phase II

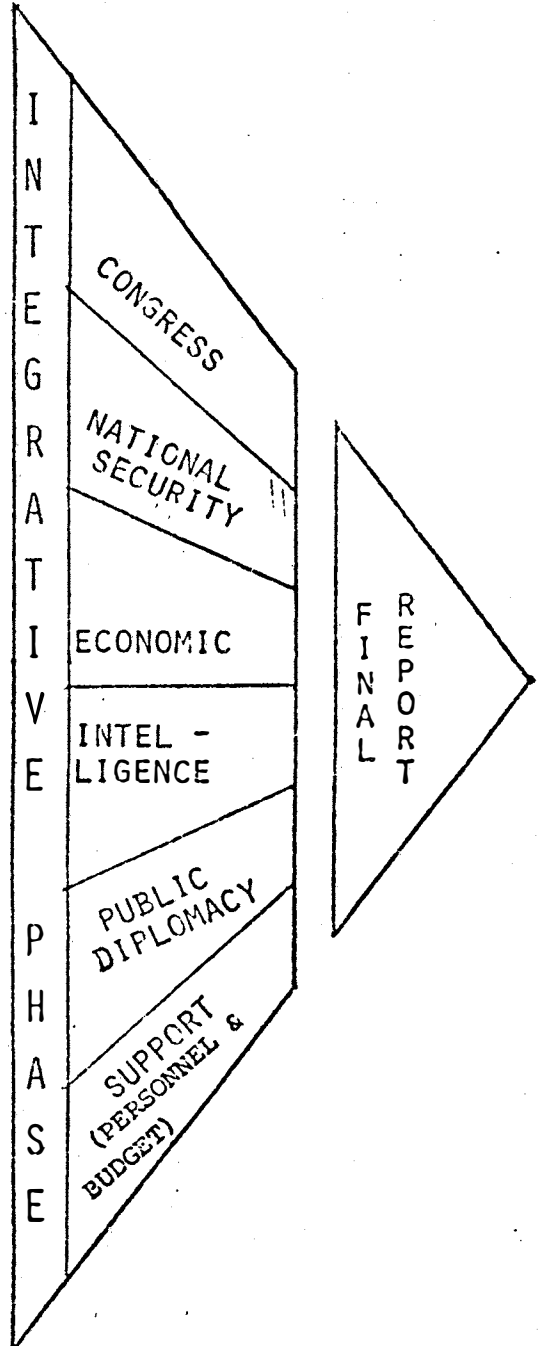
